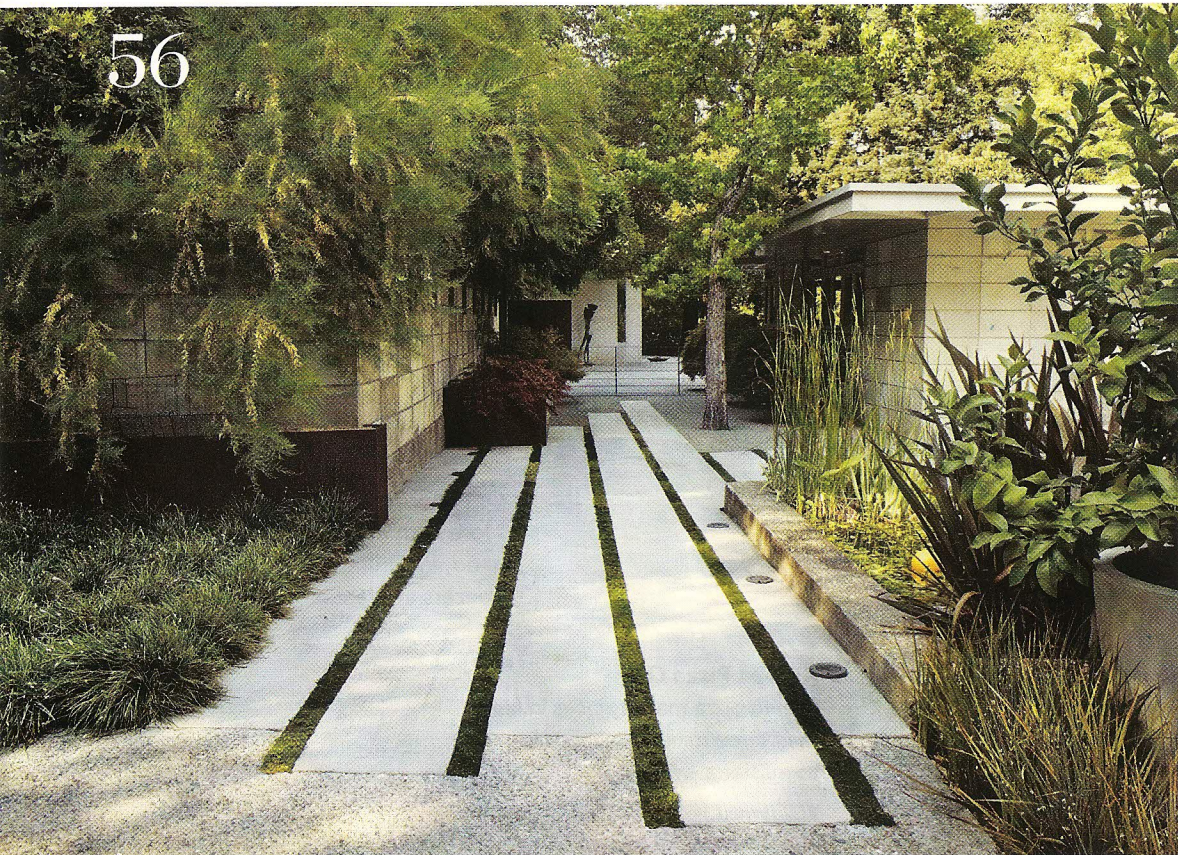

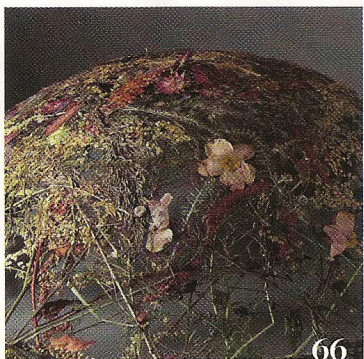

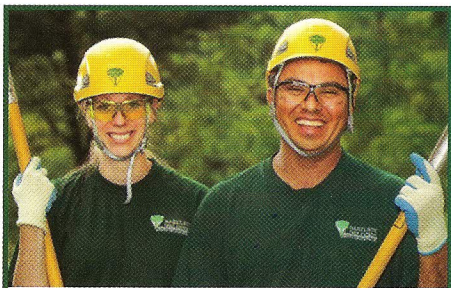

INSIDE OR OUT, CONCRETE IS AS REFINED AS EVER



With an increasing number of designers and artisans working with concrete these days, the selection of products geared toward the home has never been greater. Here are a few of our current favorites:

1. Foscarini's Aplomb suspended lamp, designed by Paolo Lucidi and Luca Pevere, is available in gray, white, or brown. (\$805)

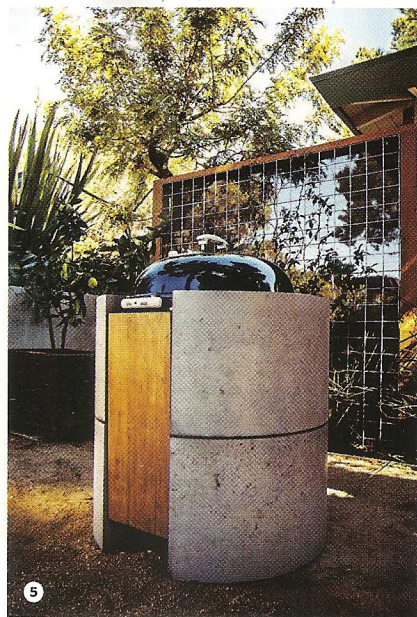
2. James De Wulf's sturdy concrete bar cart is useful indoors or out, with its large platform for glasses and a handy shelf for bottles below. (\$6,000)

3. Created from folded fabric and concrete, **Florian Schmid's** made-to-order **Stool A**, from his Stitching Concrete series, brings warmth to the industrial material. (about \$940)

4. NativeCast's small planter is made from a DIY kit, which comes complete with eco-concrete, a round mold, organic potting soil, a mixing spoon, and a seed pack. A square planter is also available. (\$10)

5. Designed to disguise the grill, **Fu-Tung Cheng's** DIY **Silo Surround** kit comes with the designer's celebrated concrete mix. (\$185)

6. Made from hand-sanded, glass-reinforced concrete, **Eldorado Stone's** new **Outdoor Artisan Fire Bowls** are one-of-a-kind and come in a variety of colors and finishes. (about \$2,500)
